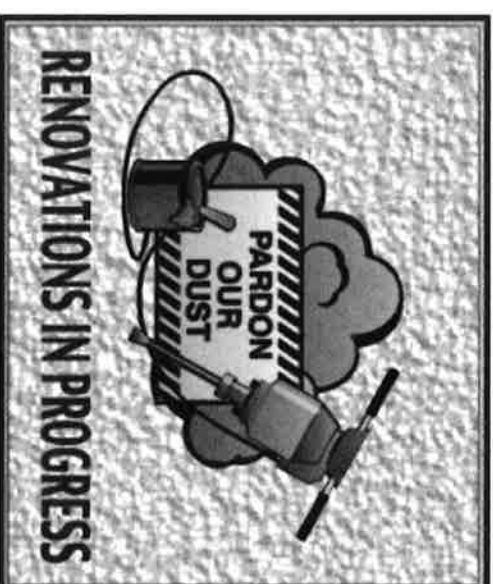

RENOVATE RIGHT LEAD BASED PAINT PROGRAM



This brochure is to give you basic information
regarding the removal of lead based paint.

IT'S THE LAW!

Federal and Washington State law, requires contractors that disturb painted surfaces in homes, child care facilities and schools, built before 1978 to be certified and follow specific work practices to prevent lead contamination. Always ask to see your contractor's certification.

Federal and Washington State law, requires that individuals receive certain information before renovating six square feet or more of painted surfaces in a room for interior projects, or more than twenty square feet of painted surfaces for exterior projects, or window replacement or demolition in housing, child care facilities and schools built before 1978.

- ❖ Homeowners and tenants: renovators must give you "The Lead-Safe Certified Guide to Renovate Right" before starting work.
- ❖ Child care facilities, including preschools and kindergarten classrooms, and the families of children under six years of age that attend those facilities: renovators must provide a copy of "The Lead-Safe Certified Guide to Renovate Right" to child care facilities and general renovation information to families whose children attend those facilities.

THE FACTS ABOUT LEAD

- Lead can affect children's brains and developing nervous systems, causing reduced IQ, learning disabilities, and behavioral problems. Lead is also harmful to adults.
- Lead dust is the most common way people are exposed to lead. People can also get lead in their bodies from lead in soil or paint chips. Lead dust is often invisible.
- Lead-based paint was used in more than 38 million homes until it was banned for residential use in 1978.
- Projects that disturb lead-based paint can create dust and endanger you and your family. Don't let this happen to you. Follow the practices described in this pamphlet to protect you and your family.
